Paryushan Mahaparva 2025 – A Time of Reflection and Renewal

Shree Visa Oshwal Community Nairobi observed Paryushan Mahaparva 2025 from 20th to 27th August 2025, under the guidance of Abhishekbhai Shah and Parshvabhai Shah from India.

Each day began with early morning prayers, Pakshaal, and Ashta Prakari Pooja, followed by Snatra Pooja and Atthai Vyakhyan & Kalpasutra Vanchan at the Upashray. Devotees gathered daily for Pratikraman, Pravachans, Aarti, and Bhakti Bhavna, with Aangi and Kalpasutra Uchhavani beautifully performed as part of the celebrations.

A special highlight was the Shree Mahavir Swami Janma Vanchan and 14 Swapna celebration held on Sunday, 24th August, which brought together the community in devotion, joy, and festivity. This was followed in the evening with Raas-Garba in honour of the auspicious occasion.

The week of prayers, fasting, and self-reflection concluded on Wednesday, 27th August, with Samvatsari Pratikraman, where men, women, and children participated in large numbers. On Thursday, 28th August, the community joyfully marked the conclusion of the festival with the traditional Parna Ceremony at Oshwal Centre, honouring Tapasvis who observed six or more upvas.

Paryushan is a time to strengthen our Jain values of peace, forgiveness, and non-violence. Members embraced these values wholeheartedly, coming together in unity, devotion, and gratitude. The festival ended with the universal greeting of reconciliation and forgiveness:


This is celebrated on the 5th Day of Paryushan when all Jains celebrate the 14 dreams that Trishala Mata (Bhagwan Mahavir's Mother) had when Lord Mahavir was to be born.

The Janma Vanchan of Shree Mahavir Swami signifies more than just the birth of a revered spiritual figure, the Vanchan represents the fulfillment of a divine prophecy and the commencement of a journey that would profoundly influence spiritual and ethical thought. His life's work stands as a beacon of non-violence, truth, and self-discipline, guiding countless individuals on their spiritual paths and contributing significantly to the rich tapestry of global spirituality.

King Siddhartha and Queen Trishla were blessed with the great fortune of being the parents of Bhagwan Mahavir. On the beautiful moonlit night, when Queen Trishla conceived the Tirthankar Bhagwan, she saw the auspicious 14 dreams and each dream symbolised a quality that the child would possess. Devotees did the darshan of 14 dreams seen by Trishala Mata and heard the Vanchan which was conducted by lecturers from India, Abhishekbhai and Parshvabhai. Diyan's Dream on Kilimanjaro

On 13th August 2025, son Diyan Shah (12-12-2014) reached the Uhuru Peak of Mount Kilimanjaro (5,895m) at just 10 years old.

The climb was not easy. Guided by Baraka, whose words "pole pole" and motto "one team, one dream, till the top we don't stop" stayed with him, Diyan kept moving through the freezing darkness. The temperature was well below zero, and the pain in his feet was almost unbearable, but he never gave up.

They set out from Kibo Hut at 12:10am, pushed for nine hours to the summit, then two more hours back down to Kibo. After a quick lunch and packing up, they walked another three hours to Horombo Hut. It was a 15–16 hour day on foot, one of the toughest challenges a young climber could face.

Through it all, Diyan's spirit carried him — slow steps, steady breaths, and the belief that he could make

This summit has been his dream since he climbed Mount Kenya's Lenana Peak in 2022. Now he hopes to take on more mountains around the world and, more importantly, to inspire other children his age to be adventurous, courageous, and to join him on future climbs as friends and teammates.

As parents, watching him live this dream has been the most humbling and inspiring experience of our lives.



At just 8 years old, Nandini has made history by becoming the youngest Asian girl in East Africa to reach the Uhuru Peak of Mount Kilimanjaro (5,895m). Scaling Africa's highest mountain is a feat many seasoned trekkers dream of, and her courage, resilience, and determination carried her through to the summit.

Her elder brother Kush, 11 years old, also displayed extraordinary strength and commitment, climbing an impressive 5,000m above sea level before being stopped by altitude sickness. Though he could not complete the summit, his effort and perseverance remain deeply inspiring.

This remarkable journey was not theirs alone. With the unwavering support and encouragement of their parents, Hanikssa and Nayan, the family trekked together, step by step, proving that discipline, teamwork, and love can move mountains — quite literally.

The Kilimanjaro climb is only one milestone in their adventurous journey. Together, the family has also conquered Le Satima, Mount Kenya's Lenana Peak, Elephant Hill, Suswa, Olesekut, Kiou, Kalembwani, Oldonyo Sabuk, Iveti Hill, Table Mountain, Teleki Mountain, Sleeping Warrior, Burguret Hill bamboo forest, Masaku Twin Peaks, and Logonot.

These climbs showcase not only their love for the outdoors but also their commitment to living courageously as a family, inspiring the community with the message that no dream is too big when pursued with passion and unity.
